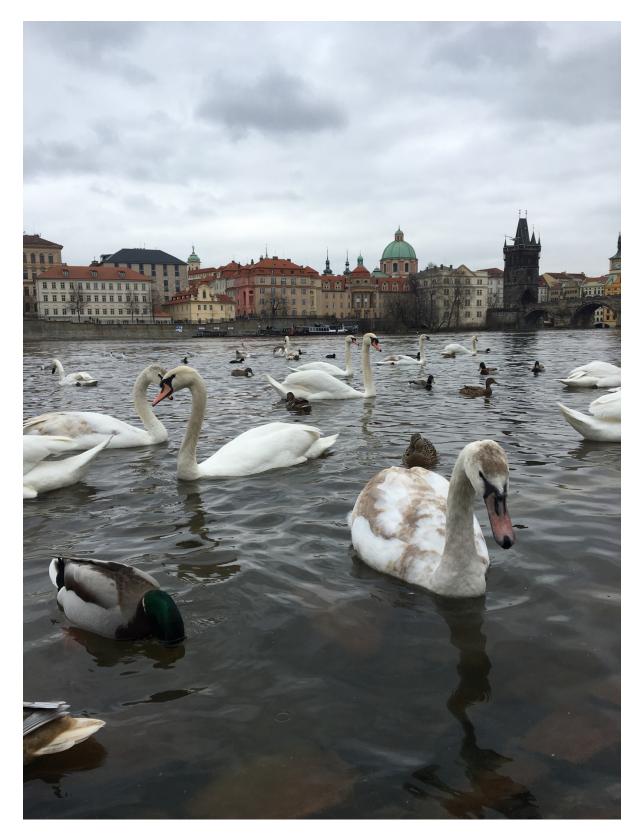

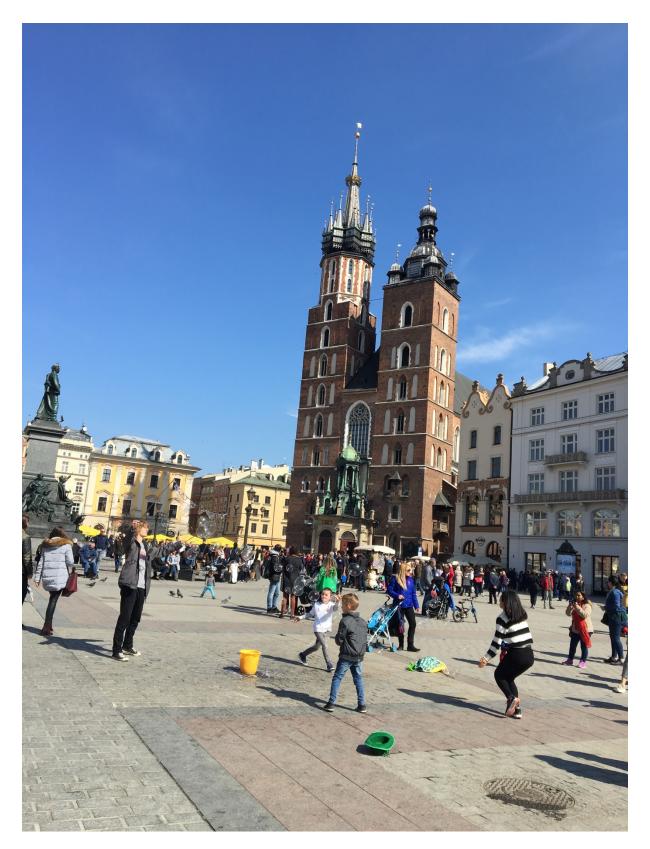

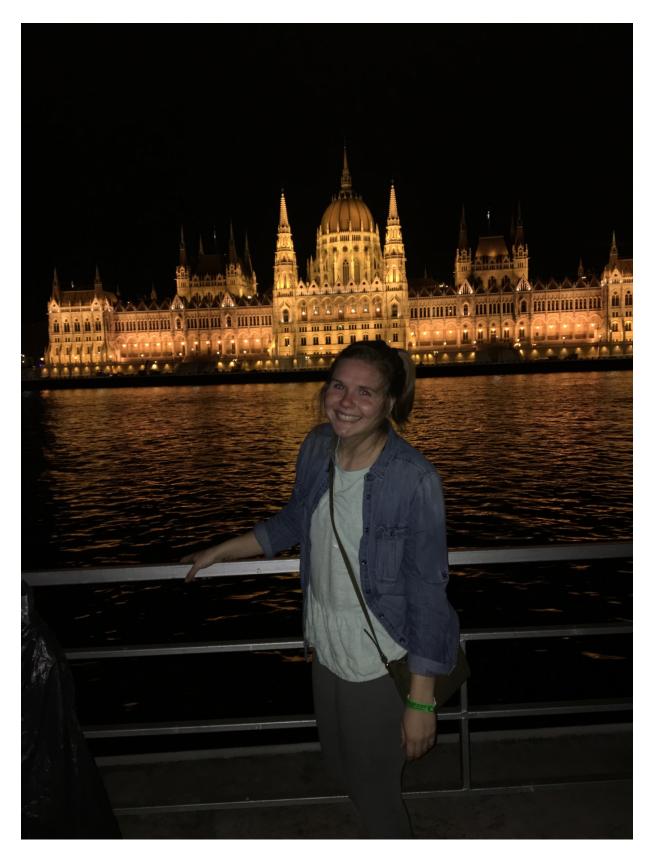
St. Stephen's Cathedral: Vienna, Austria
